I believe the changes in the makeup of the Boards in the last several years have seen the community grow in a number of ways. We have seen the quantity of lot sales soar in the past few years with owners that want to live here year round, on weekends or as Snow Birds, as Maggie and I. I believe we can attribute this to Ray Dilcox our Resort Manager who has made himself available to assist interested buyers and sellers. I have spoken to a number of new owners who have told me he was one of the reasons they bought their property. Over and over he has demonstrated what a great asset he is to our Resort.

A Word from the Resort Manager

Skookum's The Place to be!

Wow, what another great year we are having. The Resort has never been busier. With the projects committee building and improving the resort, the activities committee keeping us fed and entertained, the election committee setting us up for future success and the many individual events makes for an active, thriving committee.

As a result of all this, Skookum Rendezvous is definitely on the radar as the RV's place to be. With 29 properties sold this year and no doubt more sales before the season ends. Let's continue to welcome new friends to the neighborhood.

Part of my commitment has always been to assist both the owner trying to sell their lot and those that are looking to call Skookum home. I am pleased to report that those 29 property sales again are pushing the \$1,000,000 mark resulting in \$20,000 in transfer fee revenue. That transfer fee money has a trickle effect that pays for our advertising and website and offsets the added payroll expense of having a manager. Lastly, I am also excited to note that the average Skookum property has seen an increased resale price of \$7,000 over last year.

This year there are six candidates who have stepped up to fill the four vacancies due to time limits and a resignation. There are several CC&R changes to be voted on in Camelot and Skookum. As a reminder again and again, if you are a Skookum owner you are also a Camelot owner. We are already a week into this process and less than half of the owners have voted.

The Election Committee worked very hard over the year to develop policy and procedures to enable owners to **vote easily on-line in a couple of minutes** without returning ballots in the mail (a cost saving to the HOAs' of over \$700.) This method has been tested numerous times with great feedback from the owners. We have also brought this to our Attorney who ensured the Board of the legality of the process.

It is beyond me that owners who purchased here in Skookum cannot take a few moments to protect their investment, voice their concerns, and **VOTE!** As of this writing, Monday, July 31, there are only 43% of Skookum Rendezvous owners and 45% of Camelot Shores who have voted.

I have asked several owners if they have voted. To my amazement some stated they vote no on everything and some say they simply don't vote. My response is "You don't have a voice if you don't vote!" These are the same people that are the first to complain and the last to encourage positive feedback.

just before sitting down to a meal, they may get a call for help, and they immediately respond, because that is the responsibility that they've accepted. Again, these folks are VOLUNTEERS. I thank the community of Skookum for getting Fired Up! and doing such an excellent job of making the fundraiser a terrific success. You should know that when we hit \$5,000 (not the final accounting), one of the firefighters had tears in her eyes.

The planning and logistics of Fired Up! took around two months. We were mentioned in the *Newport Miner* with stories and press releases for four weeks leading up to the event (a special acknowledgement to Don Gronning of the *Miner* for his patient assistance). Firefighters spread the flyers all over the District 6 area. We also had coverage on the local radio station KUBS. Craig Shantz (your neighbor and firefighter) took over the parking and shuttling logistics. Craig was supported by Steve Kollar, Bonnie Chale, Jerry Verity, **Dan Tremblay** and Dean Selhay. But the day could not have gone on so incredibly smoothly without Diane Shantz and Bobbie Ford.

It seems that yard sales are one of Diane's entertainment, so she took over and what a great job she did. This area raked in \$1,403. Every Tuesday, she and Craig picked up your donations (If you saw the pile, would you not wonder at the possibility that some of you might have basements in your sheds?). Collecting and pricing all that stuff! Thank you, Diane and all of Diane's helpers! And thanks also to all of those who worked the yard sale on a very, very hot day.

Yes, lots of stuff was left over. The clean up the next day was accomplished also by many of your friends and neighbors. Betty and Roger Gauthier took part of the left-overs and donated it to their church's thrift store in Priest River. Marybeth Kelly was able to find an organization to pick up the rest. And there was a lot of stuff. We were all concerned that, like a bad fungus, we might never get rid of it. If you missed out on any of these treats, well, your loss! Plus, all of the above donated all of the proceeds to the cause.

The raffle winner of the print donated by aerial drone photographer, Lieven Walston was Jeff Sloan. (Ironically, Jeff's wife, Clair, had bought the identical small framed picture for Jeff.) The winner of the lap quilt, donated by Sharon Verity was Cheryl Gambel, a new resident to Skookum. Congratulations!

What is the final accounting? Contributions are still coming in, but so far the Firefighters will be receiving \$7,365. Yes, they will be able to purchase their TIC (thermal infrared camera). Due to a grant, they will also be purchasing a portable EKG unit. Even though the Resort Aid Team (RAT) of Skookum is disbanded, a bank account still exists. An arrangement has been made for District 6 to use these monies (not counted in the final tally) to maintain Skookum's emergency medical equipment. The account is expected to be able to service Skookum's medical equipment for the next 8 years. Thank you Bobbie Ford, former member of the RAT, team for initiating this course of action.

Many names need recognition, but unfortunately and fortunately, there's just too many to mention. There were sign makers, furniture movers, trashcan care, security folks, folks who ran to the bank for change, all the Firefighters who helped with everything, makers of lemonade, and of course Ray Dilcox for not only bringing back Skookum wear, but also maintaining a spread sheet during the event. Fired Up! was a really big deal! It worked! Thank you all! \$7,365 and still counting.
